Gender, madness and society in 20th-century Britain

Despite significant advances in biopsychiatry, social and cultural factors still play an important part in interpreting and treating mental illness. This module highlights factors that influenced ideas about mental illness through the 20th century, examining the ways in which concepts of 'normal' behaviour were heavily contingent on broader social fears and the cultural context of the time. **CPD credits: 1**

Doctors often struggle to assess risk and decision-making capacity in patients with eating disorders, and to apply mental health legislation to protect life and health without undue restriction of liberty.
