1991 APSA Annual Meeting was received by John Zaller, University of California at Los Angeles, for "Information and Incumbency Advantage in Congressional Elections." The award was presented by Michael Delli Carpini, Barnard College.

The Murray Edelman Distinguished Career Award was created to honor Murray Edelman and is given to an individual whose lifetime scholarship has advanced our understanding of political communication. The first recipient of this award is Doris Graber of the University of Illinois, Chicago. The award was presented at the Annual Meeting by Darrell West, Brown University. Professor Graber was cited for her scholarship and for her leadership in developing the field of political communication.

Political Economy Organized Section

The Best Book or Article on Political Economy published in the last three calendar years was a joint award this year. The recipients were Alice H. Amsden, New School for Social Research, for Asia's Next Giant: South Korea and Late Industrialization, published by Oxford University Press, and Robert Wade, University of Sussex, for Governing the Market: Economic Theory and the Role of Government in East Asian Industrialization, published by Princeton University Press. G. John Ikenberry of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and the University of Pennsylvania presented this award.

The Political Economy Organized Section was unable to give an award for 1991, so they also presented the 1991 award retroactively for the Best Book or Article on Political Economy to Ronald Rogowski, University of California at Los Angeles, for his book Commerce and Coalitions: How Trade Affects Domestic Political Alignments, published by Princeton University Press.

Committee on the Status of Blacks Honors APSA Fellows

The Committee on the Status of Blacks in the Profession held a reception in honor of all African-American Graduate Fellows on September 4 in conjunction with the Annual Meeting. The APSA African-American Graduate Fellowship Program was instituted in 1970. Since its introduction, it has produced 39 Ph.D.s, 15 A.B.D.'s, and many more fellows are currently completing their coursework.

The reception was organized by Christopher Foreman, Committee chair, and Maurice C. Woodard, APSA staff associate.

APSA President James Q. Wilson presided at the Association's 1992 Annual Meeting Business Meeting September 5, where new officers were elected.

Short Courses Offered at Annual Meeting

The Law and Courts, Politics and Life Sciences, and History and Politics organized sections offered the following short courses at the Annual Meeting this summer respectively:

Public Law: The State of the Field. led by John Brigham, University of Massachusetts; Greg Caldeira, Ohio State University; and Leslie Goldstein, University of Delaware; Genetics and Public Policy, led by Andrea Bonnicksen, Northern Illinois University, and Robert H. Blank, University of Canterbury, New Zealand; and Historical Approaches to the Study of Public Policy, led by Theda Skocpol and Paul Pierson, Harvard University. The Association continued its successful Leading Scholar Series for Graduate Students. featuring Theodore J. Lowi, Cornell University. In addition, The Graduate School of Political Management at George Washington University, helped to sponsor Ethics in American Politics, led by Gregory G. Lebel, George Washington University.

APSA's Bunche Students Attend Annual Meeting

Eleven of the 25 students participating in the Ralph Bunche Summer Institute came to Chicago to attend APSA's Annual Meeting. The students were recognized at the reception given by the Committee on the Status of Blacks in the Profession.

The Bunche Institute is hosted by a consortium of five Atlanta institutions: Spelman College, Emory University, Morehouse College, Clark Atlanta University and Georgia State University. Each year 25 outstanding African American undergraduates are selected to attend the six-week program whose purpose is to encourage enrollment in graduate school. This year students from 16 states attended the Bunche Institute. Eight of the 25 participants hailed from historically black colleges.

Students enroll in two courses, one in American politics and one in methodology. This summer the courses were taught by Jeanne Meadows of Spelman and Alan Abramowitz of Emory. The Institute is directed by Lois Moreland of Spelman College and is sustained by the volunteer efforts of Tobe Johnson of Morehouse, William Boone of Clark Atlanta, William Thomas of Georgia State, and Eleanor Main and Micheal Giles of Emory. In addition, many
