The approach of the Institute is interdisciplinary, with current emphasis in the fields of sociology, psychology, political science and economics (including agricultural economics). It is hoped that the earlier interests of the Institute in history, human geography and demography can also be extended.

Most of the results obtained by Institute staff and affiliated workers are published in its own publications. Apart from books, these are the journal -- recently re-named AFRICAN SOCIAL RESEARCH -- the ZAMBIA PAPERS, and the COMMUNICATIONS.
