#### THE BRITISH COUNCIL PRIZE IN THE HUMANITIES

The North American Conference on British Studies announces the 1983 competition for the British Council Prize in the Humanities. The prize of \$750 (supported by a grant from the British Council) is awarded annually for the best book published anywhere by a North American scholar in any aspect of British studies within the following humanistic disciplines: literary history, literary criticism, history of art and architecture, history of music, history of religion and philosophy, history of ideas, intellectual history. (The competition is not open to works in the social sciences, including political, diplomatic, social history, etc. for which the John Ben Snow Prize has been established.) Nominations may be made by the author or by the publisher of the book to be nominated. No publisher may nominate more than one title in any

#### THE JOHN BEN SNOW FOUNDATION PRIZE IN HISTORY AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES

The prize is awarded annually to a North American author for the best book in History and the Social Sciences in the field of British studies. The field includes most of Irish history. Studies involving the Empire-Commonwealth are eligible if they focus on relationships with Britain and British civilization. Books in the social sciences must be strongly oriented toward contributing to an understanding of the development or character of British civilization in one or more of its aspects. The book may be published anywhere in the world; nominations may be made by the author or by the publisher. The amount of the prize is \$750.

The next award of the prize will be made in Autumn 1983, to a book published in 1981 or 1982. Thereafter the prize will be awarded to a book published the preceding calendar vear.
