



The British Empire-For Better or for Worse

For most of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, the British ruled over a colossal empire that stretched from one end of the map to the other. One cannot contemplate modern history without considering the role of the British Empire.

Combining superb color and blackand-white illustrations with authoritative text, The Cambridge Illustrated History of the British Empire is an illuminating survey of the development and impact of the British Empire from



the end of the American Revolution to the present day. 


