ALBION is published quarterly, April, July, October, January. Manuscripts and all editorial correspondence are to be sent to the editor, Dr. Michael J. Moore, Department of History, Appalachian State University, Boone, NC 28608. All manuscripts, doubled-spaced and in duplicate, should conform, especially in footnotes, to the Chicago Manual of Style. Manuscripts should not exceed 9,000 words and for their return be accompanied by postage.

BOOK REVIEWS evaluate the scholarship of books and demonstrate their contribution and relevance to other literature. Books in all areas of British, Irish, and imperial history will be considered for review. Albion does not accept unsolicited book reviews and does not underwrite the opinions of its reviewers. Persons interested in writing reviews should send a Curriculum Vita to the editor. Books for review and all related correspondence are to be sent to the editor. Proposals for review essays up to 4,000 words concerning the bibliography of a field, era, or important theme in British history should be communicated to the editor.

ABSTRACTS of papers and addresses delivered at recognized NACBS meetings are eligible for publication. They may not exceed 125 words. Program chairpersons are to arrange the collection of abstracts and forward them with an official program in one package to the editor within four weeks of the conclusion of the meeting. Albion reserves the right to decide whether abstracts submitted will be published.

ALBION is received by members of the North American Conference on British Studies. Individual membership in the NACBS is available at \$20 per year (for Albion, The Journal of British Studies & The Intelligencer), or \$13 per year (for Albion & The Intelligencer). Membership dues are to be sent to the NACBS Treasurer, John F. Naylor, Department of History, Amherst Campus, S.U.N.Y., Buffalo, NY 14261.

SUBSCRIPTIONS for persons not members of the NACBS and for all institutions are to be sent to Albion, Department of History, Appalachian State University, Boone, NC 28608.
