## Conference Brief

(Taken from an outline by Conference Promotion Chairman, Judith Lynne Hanna)

The 1972 CORD INSTITUTE entitled "New Dimensions in Dance Research, Anthropology and Dance, I: The American Indian" was held in Tucson at the University of Arizona and the Yaqui Villages, from March 26 until April 7. The Institute was in two parts: the Conference, which included presentations of papers and interactive sessions with scholars from anthropology, dance and American Indian cultures, dealing with 1) a general understanding of the role of dance in a society from an anthropological point of view, and 2) a review of varied anthropological research instruments applicable to the study of dance-field study, linguistic concepts, choreometrics, kinesics, etc., and field observation of the Yaqui Holy Week ceremonies, planned to expose Institute participants to research-observation of the ceremonials, within the ritual context, with the guidance of experts in the use of one or more of the conference-discussed research instruments. The Institute also took pleasure in hornoring Gertrude Kurath and Marian Van Tuyl.
