THE CONTRIBUTORS

ROBERT W. CAMPBELL is an instructor in the Department of Economics at the University of Southern California. He has recently completed his Ph.D. thesis at Harvard University on the subject of Soviet accounting.

S. N. EISENSTADT has returned to Jerusalem, where he is head of the Department of Sociology at the Hebrew University, after a year as a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, Calif. He is the author of Absorption of Immigrants in Israel (1951) and From Generation to Generation: Age Groups and Social Structure (1956).

WILLIAM W. LOCKWOOD, Assistant Director of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, Princeton University, published *The Economic Development of Japan*, 1868-1938, in 1954. During the current year he is engaging in research in the Far East.

ZBIGNIEW BRZEZINSKI is Assistant Professor of Government and Research Associate of the Russian Research Center at Harvard University. Among his recent publications are *The Permanent Purge: Politics in Soviet Totalitarianism* (1956) and, with C. J. Friedrich, *Totalitarian Dictatorship and Organization*, which will appear in November 1956.

Bernard S. Morris is a political analyst who has written several studies on Communist strategy and organization. He contributed an article on the Cominform to the April 1953 issue of *World Politics*.

CARL E. SCHORSKE is Professor of History at Wesleyan University. The author of German Social Democracy, 1905-1917 (1955), and co-author, with Hoyt Price, of The Problem of Germany (1947), he is now working on an intellectual history of Vienna in the fin de siècle.

WOLFGANG F. STOLPER, Professor of Economics at the University of Michigan, has just completed a study on industrial development in East Germany under the auspices of the Center for International Studies, M.I.T. His study of mortgage finance and business cycles is to be published by the National Bureau of Economic Research.

HENRY Rosovsky, a member of the Society of Fellows at Harvard University and former editor of Explorations in Entrepreneurial History, is currently working on the statistics of long-term Japanese growth.

ALFRED G. MEYER, Director of the Research Program on the History of the CPSU, Columbia University, is the author of *The Incompatible Allies*, with Gustav Hilger (1953), *Marxism: The Unity of Theory and Practice* (1954), and *Leninism*, to be published early in 1957.

GEORGE E. TAYLOR is Director of the Far Eastern and Russian Institute of the University of Washington. His latest book, *The Far East in the Modern World*, appeared in September 1956.
