

Richard Hodder-Williams has filled a longstanding need with this readable and scholarly account of the variety and complexity of the politics of Tropical Africa. He situates the contemporary scene firmly in its historical context, stressing both the pre-colonial and colonial heritages. He emphasizes how politicians today are constrained by the past, the physical environment, and the world's economy and yet retain freedom of choice on a wide range of issues. The book is thematically organized; it gives a general overview, but provides enough detail to flesh out the realities of tribalism and corruption and to illustrate the inevitable regional variations. This broad introduction will be extremely useful as a textbook and a "must" for government officials and businessmen with dealings in the area.
