Cover: Early Rock 'n' Roll

Shown on the cover is a 1950s "record hop" with Cleveland disk jockey Alan Freed presiding. This photograph, in company with the head shots running down the back cover, illustrate the changes in the recording industry's interaction with rhythm and blues, at first performed primarily by relatively unknown black musicians like "Guitar Slim" for mostly black audiences, then transformed to the "whiter" sound of rock 'n' roll, recorded by teen idols such as Jimmy Clanton for a national audience. In this process, the willingness of small, independent record companies to promote the new music challenged the position of the major companies and broadened the definition of the American "mainstream."
