**The Society for Libyan Studies**

The Society for Libyan Studies, founded in 1969, is established as a British International Research Institute (BIRI, affiliated to the British Academy), and a Registered Charity No. 259262. Its aims are to encourage and coordinate the activities of British scholars conducting research on Libya and its wider region. The Society originally supported research into the archaeology and ancient history of Libya. Its resources funded long-term archaeology projects and their subsequent publication, including excavations in Benghazi, Tolmeita, Ajdabiyah and Medinet Sultan, plus the multi-disciplinary projects in the pre-desert valleys of Tripolitania, around Jarma in the Fazzan and on the prehistory of Cyrenaica. More recently, the Society has expanded its scope to cover a wider range of research approaches, including the natural sciences, linguistics, history and the contemporary social sciences. It also aims to foster and develop relations between British and Libyan scholars, and others working on Libya and its wider region.

Members receive the current issue of *Libyan Studies* by mail, they may attend lectures and other events, and they are entitled to use the Society's Library and Archive. They also have access to all the Society's journals online.

**Meetings**

The Society presents lectures throughout the year, these are currently virtual but we hope to resume these activities at the British Academy and University College London when possible. The Annual General Meeting takes place in June. Details of all meetings are circulated in advance to all members and are also available on the website.

**The Library and Archive**

The Society's Library has a considerable collection of books on Libyan and related North African studies. The collection is unique in Britain, and many items are rare and unavailable elsewhere. The Library is housed at the School of Oriental and African Studies Library, University of London, Thornhaugh Street, Russell Square, London WC1H 0XG. The General Secretary will provide a letter of introduction for members of the Society who wish to obtain a membership card granting access to the Library.

The Society's Archive is hosted by the University of Leicester, and the catalogue is currently being put online. It may be accessed in person, by members of the Society.

**Publications of the Society**

The Society's academic journal, *Libyan Studies*, is published in November each year. It includes articles, reports, notes and reviews relating to current research on Libya and its wider region in North Africa and the Mediterranean.
