# Rain Dancing

Sanctions in Canadian & Australian Foreign Policy / Kim Richard Nossal

A contrary perspective on international sanctions as a tool of statecraft, using Canada and Australia as case studies. Nossal finds that sanctions by these middle powers accomplish little and leave foreign governments unaffected while hurting ordinary people.

Despite the ambiguity of the term, middle powers do provide a useful focus for an investigation of the utilities of international sanctions precisely because of their middling capabilities. On the one hand, middle powers do not have the capabilities of large powers that would give their sanctions effective and instrumental impact. Unlike the great powers, middle powers simply do not have the ability to inflict serious harm on other states with sanctions. On the other hand, middle powers have relatively greater capabilities than small states or microstates. While it is possible to explain the sanctions policies of a microstate as pure symbolism - in other words, sanctions not designed to have any instrumental impact on the target - middle powers are not so small that one could simply explain their sanctions policies in symbolic terms. from Rain Dancing





Published since 1951 by the International Political Science Association (all back volumes are available), the Abstracts is a major source of bibliographic information in political science. It publishes abstracts of articles in specialized and non specialized periodicals, including major vearbooks. Articles in English are abstracted in English; those in other languages (about one fourth of the total) are abstracted in French, with all titles translated into English. In 1994 it published 6,397 abstracts from over 1,000 journals, in six issues. Each issue carries a detailed subject index and a list of the periodicals examined. The final issue of each volume provides a cumulative subject index and an author index.
