Since its inception in 1934, SAA has endeavored to stimulate interest and research in American archaeology; advocate and aid in the conservation of inchaeological resources; encourage public access to and appreciation of archaeology; oppose all looting of sites and the purchase and sale of looted inchaeological materials; and serve as a bond among those interested in the archaeology of the Americas.

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Latin American Antiquity publishes original papers on the archaeology, prehistory, and ethnohistory of Latin America, i.e., Mesoamerica, Central America, and South America, together with culturally affiliated adjacent regions. Authors submit manuscripts to the editor for consideration as ARTICLES or REPORTS in English, Spanish, or Portuguese. Authors should submit an original and three copies of their manuscripts (including all figures, tables, references, and notes), along with an abstract in both English and Spanish. Detailed information on policy, style, and technical matters of manuscript preparation is given in English in the "Editorial Policy, Information for Authors, and Style Guide for American Antiquity and Latin American Antiquity," which appeared in September 1992 (vol. 3, no. 3) and in Spanish in "Código editorial, informatión para autores y guía estilística para American Antiquity and Latin American Antiquity," which appeared in July 1997 (vol. 8, no. 2).
