Gentlemen:

In answering requests submitted to us by Members of Congress, we frequently find highly pertinent information or statements in your publication, *American Slavic and East European Review*. Members of Congress often request copies of this material to keep in their files or to use in their correspondence. In such cases it is, of course, necessary for us to obtain permission to reproduce any copyrighted material—whether by photostat, verifax, multi-lith, or other process.

It would be greatly appreciated if you would be willing to authorize us, on request of a Member of Congress and for his official use either in legislative matters or in connection with his correspondence, to reproduce from copyrighted volumes issued by your organization.

I should add that it has been our practice heretofore to ask such permissions as specific cases have arisen; and while the response has been uniformly affirmative the delay occasioned by the correspondence has been embarrassing. Our present request is thus based on the potential contribution to the advancement of the public business and is buttressed by the time factor which plays so important a part in the deliberation and correspondence of Congress.
