Canadian Neurosurgical Society

Pride of place must be given this quarter to the highly successful meeting in Toronto of the World Federation of Neurosurgical Societies. It brought credit to the whole Canadian neuroscience community. The choice of meeting place for this four yearly jamboree is always hotly contested, so it is to Alan Hudson's credit that he landed the honour. He and his unsung colleagues and their wives must have wondered at times if it was really worth it. But the judgement of those who came from far and near, including those of us who never lifted a finger to help, was enthusiastic. How Harold Hoffman managed to balance a budget of over a million dollars remains one of those minor miracles,

like the turning of the autumn leaves. You know it will happen but it still takes your breath away. These huge meetings have more the function of the *agora* than the intellectual retreat; good for communication, creativity can wait.

During the meeting a dinner was held at the King Edward Hotel to honour S. J. Peerless, the first C. G. Drake Professor of Neurosurgery at the University of Western Ontario. The guests represented world neurosurgery and the King Eddy rose splendidly to the occasion as one would expect from a member of the Savoy chain. Meanwhile the other member societies of the Canadian Congress of Neurological Sciences held their annual meeting in Montreal without the full participation of neurosurgeons for the first time since the founding of the Canadian Neurological Society and its progeny, the Congress.

Canadian Society of Clinical Neurophysiologists

CSCN awards the Jasper Prize for research in clinical neurophysiology performed by a person in training in neuroscience or within three years of having received a doctorate or specialty certificate of the Royal College. Programme directors and doctorate supervisors are urged to channel their students' best work in the direction of the Jasper Prize.

The CSCN has generously surrendered the use of Dr. Penfield's name in connection with the annual guest lectureship which will in future be designated the CSCN Lectureship. Whether this lectureship was created after the Canadian Neurosurgical Society's Penfield Lectureship, or whether CSCN decided the surgical organisation had a more proprietary claim to the title, I do not know. But this gesture ends the confusion harmful to both societies.

CSCN is pressing for a prolongation of the required training in clinical EEG, evoked potentials and EMG from the present statutory six months. Too often it is the only period during training set aside for these skills. At the same time CSCN is compiling a list of accredited centres for training in clinical neurophysiology. This will include descriptions of current research activities, the availability of positions for graduate students or fellows, and the availability — or otherwise — of local funding.

The Society is considering the creation of a category of Junior Membership with reduced membership fee and journal subscription, and the possibility of free attendance at the annual neurophysiology course.
