Elaine C. Kamarck, Senior Policy Advisor for the Vice President of the United States and a political scientist with a distinguished record as a scholar, teacher, and Democratic Party activist, has been awarded the National Capital Area Political Science Association 1996 Pi Sigma Alpha Award.
