RAPID RESPONSE: We promise to render a decision on all papers within six weeks of submission.

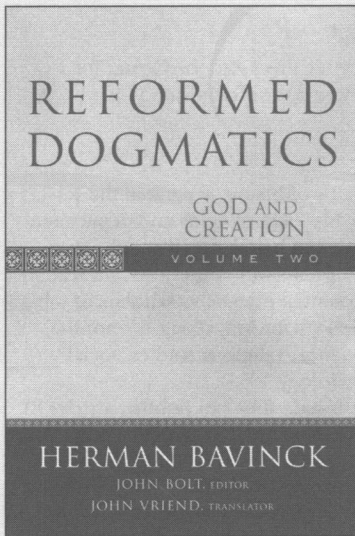
RAPID PUBLICATION: Not being bound by the slow pace of printed periodicals, IJRR will publish each article as soon as it has been copy-edited.

WHY BAYLOR?

FINALLY, THERE IS A PH.D. PROGRAM IN THE SOCIOLOGY OF RELIGION that is adequately staffed and able to offer each student a customized program including almost unlimited research opportunities.

In the past two years Baylor has hired six sociologists of religion and intends to hire several more — in addition to affiliated faculty in other social science departments. On September 1, 2004 the Center for Religious Inquiry Across the Disciplines (CRIAD) opened its doors, having already obtained very substantial research funding, and anticipating much more. One of its first projects is the Baylor National Survey Study of American Religion. CRIAD also sponsors the Interdisciplinary Journal of Research on Religion (IJRR) which begins publication January 1, 2005.

In August 2004 we welcomed our first five graduate students, each with remarkable qualifications. All are fully-funded and will have their pick of many potential research projects on-going at CRIAD, or they will be helped to initiate new projects that better suit their interests.

As undergraduates, our current students majored in economics, history, religious studies, and sociology, but all have a burning desire to apply social scientific methods to religious questions. As for what questions, our current faculty reflect a full spectrum of interests and methodologies and we soon will expand our international resources. While several of us are giving considerable attention to Latin America, several others plan to visit China this year and we welcomed our first postdoctoral fellow from China in October, 2004.

Instructions to Publishers

- Complete and file one copy of this form with your postmaster annually on or before October 1. Keep a copy of the completed form for your records.
- In cases where the stockholder or security holder is a trustee, include in items 10 and 11 the name of the person or corporation for whom the trustee is acting. Also include the names and addresses of individuals who are stockholders who own or hold 1 percent or more of the total amount of bonds, mortgages, or other securities of the publishing corporation. In item 11, if none, check the box. Use blank sheets if more space is required.
- Be sure to furnish all circulation information called for in item 15. Free circulation must be shown in items 15c, e, and f.
- Item 15h. Copies not Distributed, must include (1) newsstand copies originally stated on Form 3541, and returned to the publisher; (2) estimated returns from news agents, and (3) copies for office use, leftovers, spoiled, and all other copies not distributed.
- If the publication had Periodicals authorization as a general or requester publication, this Statement of Ownership, Management, and Circulation must be published; it must be printed in any issue in October or, if the publication is not published during October, the first issue printed after October.

Awards of the American Society of Church History:

The Frank S. and Elizabeth D. Brewer Prize, offered annually, is a subvention fund of \$1,000 to assist a press in publishing a book-length manuscript in church history. The prize is limited to first books. The monetary grant will be made upon receipt of a commitment in writing from a publisher accepting the manuscript. Entries in their final form must be received by 1 November.

The Albert C. Outler Prize is an award in the amount of \$1,000 to the author of the best book published in the two previous calendar years in ecumenical church history. "Ecumenical" is to be construed as concerned chiefly with problems of Christian unity and disunity (doctrinal, cultural, institutional) or with interactions between Christianity and other religious movements in any historical period. Authors of eligible books or any member of the Society may nominate titles for consideration; authors should submit a copy of the book. Nominations must be received by 1 March in even-numbered years.

The Philip Schaff Prize is an award in the amount of \$1,000 to the author of the best book published in the two previous calendar years, originating in the North American scholarly community and presenting original research on any period in the history of Christianity. Authors of eligible books or any member of the Society may nominate titles for consideration; authors should submit a copy of the book. Nominations must be received by 1 March in odd-numbered years.

The Jane Dempsey Douglass Prize is an annual award in the amount of \$250 for the author of the best essay published during the previous calendar year on any aspect of the role of women in the history of Christianity. Authors of eligible articles and any member of the Society may nominate titles for consideration. Nominations, accompanied if possible by a copy of the article, must be received by 1 August.

The Sidney E. Mead Prize, offered annually, is an award in the amount of \$250 for the author of the best unpublished essay in any field of church history written by a doctoral candidate or recent graduate whose manuscript stems directly from doctoral research. The manuscript will be published in *Church History*. Entries of no more than twenty-five double-spaced pages, including double-spaced endnotes, must be submitted by 1 July.

A work may be submitted for only one ASCH competition. **For more information, or to nominate a book or submit a manuscript, write to the American Society of Church History, Yale University Divinity School, 409 Prospect St., Box 473, New Haven, CT 06511.**

Church History: Studies in Christianity and Culture is published four times per year (March, June, September, and December) by the American Society of Church History. Membership dues for individuals in the U.S. and Canada are \$50 per year for regular members, \$25 per year for retired persons, and free for two years for students with the approval of a professor who is a member of the Society (after two years, students pay \$25 annually until graduation). Dues for individuals in other countries are \$75 per year for regular members, \$30 per year for retired persons and students (with the same two-year gratis stipulations). Institutional subscriptions are \$75 per year in the U.S. and Canada, \$100 per year in all other countries. Single issues are \$25 each. Please make remittances payable to "American Society of Church History."

The editors request (1) three copies of the manuscript (in order to protect the author's anonymity during the review process, the author's name should appear only on the title page of the essay); (2) three copies of a 200-word abstract (if *Church History* publishes the essay, the abstract may be printed above the first line of the text of the article and/or it may be included on the *Church History* web page at www.churchhistory.org); (3) an electronic submission of both the manuscript and abstract as an email attachment in Word, WordPerfect, or Rich-Text format (instead of an email attachment, you may submit your manuscript and abstract on a 3½ inch diskette).
