## PHILIP SCHAFF PRIZE

The American Society of Church History takes pleasure in announcing the establishment of the Philip Schaff Prize. The prize is in the amount of \$1,000.00 to be paid every other year to the author of the best book published in English, originating in the North American scholarly community, and presenting original research or interpretation in the history of Christianity or any period thereof.

Books considered for this award must be published during the years 1977 or 1978. Any member of the Society may nominate books for consideration for the Schaff Prize. Nominations of titles of books must be received by the Chairperson of the Committee on Research of the Society or William B. Miller, Secretary, American Society of Church History, 305 East Country Club Lane, Wallingford, PA 19086, by March 1, 1979. The announcement of the Schaff Prize will be made at the annual meeting of the Society in December 1979.


