Two factors have brought the world economy to the center of the international political stage. One is the end of the Cold War, and the increasing importance of economic factors relative to strategic ones in the foreign policies of the major powers. The other is the emergence of a rapidly expanding and genuinely global economy, one that is defined not just by trade but also by investment and the diffusion of advanced technologies and expertise. *New Forces in the World Economy* examines the features of the new world economic order, beginning with a review of the changing structure of the global economy of the 1990s. Subsequent chapters examine issues of competitiveness, investment, trade, and finance. The volume concludes with a discussion of the governance agenda, including essays that address major international institutions, prominent bilateral relationships, and the role of the private sector.
