
Oryx back issues needed

Breeding endangered marmosets

The Society's 100% Fund contributed £200 to the cost of six cages to establish breeding colonies of three highly endangered marmosets (*Callithrix flaviceps*, *C. aurita*, and *C. geoffroyi*) at the Rio de Janeiro Primate Centre. The centre is also breeding other endangered primates endemic to south-east Brazil, whose forests have largely been destroyed, including some of the most endangered in the world, the lion tamarins of the genus *Leontopithecus*. The centre intends to reintroduce primates into the wild, in national reserves, wherever this is possible.
