THE CONTRIBUTORS

Hajo HOLBORN is Randolph W. Townsend Professor of History at Yale University. Among his recent publications is *The Political Collapse of Europe* (1951), which he developed from an article that appeared in *World Politics* in July 1949.

ARTHUR F. WRIGHT is Associate Professor of History at Stanford University. Before receiving his doctorate in Chinese Language and History at Harvard in 1948, he traveled in China and Japan as a fellow of the Harvard-Yenching Institute.

NATHAN LEITES is a member of the staff of the RAND Corporation, Visiting Lecturer at Yale University, and Lecturer at the School of Applied Psychoanalysis, The New York Psychoanalytic Institute. He has two new books—*A Study of Bolshevism* and (with Elsa Bernaut) *The Ritual of Liquidation*—scheduled for publication later this year.

GEORGE KEMÉNY was formerly the economics editor of a leading Budapest newspaper. At the end of the war, he became Hungary's Secretary of State for Finance; after serving with successive coalition governments, he resigned for political reasons and went into exile in 1948. Dr. Kemény has since engaged in research at the Royal Institute of International Affairs, and is at present active in Radio Free Europe.

MORRIS WATNICK, formerly associated with the Office of Intelligence Research in the Department of State, has translated Rudolf Hilferding's *Das Finanzkapital* and is now working on a study of the sociology of Communist movements in underdeveloped areas.

LEON D. EPSTEIN is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin. He is preparing a book on the attitudes of British political parties toward postwar American foreign policy.

BARRINGTON MOORE, JR., is a Lecturer in the Department of Social Relations and a permanent staff member of the Russian Research Center at Harvard University. The author of *Soviet Politics: The Dilemma of Power* (1950), he has just completed a study on the sources of stability and potential change in the Soviet social system, to be published early in 1954.

WALDEMAR GURIAN is Professor of Political Science at the University of Notre Dame and editor of *The Review of Politics*. His publications include *Bolshevism: An Introduction to Soviet Communism* (1952), and he has recently edited *Soviet Imperialism* (1953).
