ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION - ONE GUINEA

THE object of the Society is to effect for Rome what the Hellenic Society, now for more than half a century, has been doing for Greece. Its scope embraces the history, art and archaeology of Rome, Italy and the Roman Empire, down to about A.D. 700. Medieval and Renaissance Italy have been left to other bodies already engaged on these subjects.

THE JOURNAL OF ROMAN STUDIES

The Journal of Roman Studies $(11 \times 7\frac{1}{2} \text{ inches})$ is published by the Society in half-yearly parts—for the duration of the war in one part—and is issued gratuitously and post free to all subscribing members. The Journal is sold to non-subscribers at the rate of 30s. a volume or 15s. a part.

An arrangement has been effected between the Roman Society, the Hellenic Society and the Classical Association by which the *Journals* of the three bodies will be conducted in harmony and will occupy distinct provinces of learning.

THE LIBRARY AND COLLECTIONS

In connection with the Hellenic Society, the Roman Society maintains at 50 Bedford Square a joint library of Greek and Roman art, archaeology and history, and a collection of lantern-slides and photographs. These are open to members of both Societies.

Members of the Roman Society are entitled in respect of their membership to borrow three books at a time, and to borrow lantern slides at a charge of 2d. each. Both books and slides can be sent by post.

All communications respecting books and lantern slides should be made to the Librarian at 50 Bedford Square, London, W.C. 1.

MEETINGS

Meetings for the reading and discussion of papers which, by permission of the Society of Antiquaries, are usually held at Burlington House, Piccadilly, W. 1, are arranged during the present emergency at various places in the country. A programme is circulated in September or October.

MEMBERSHIP AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Society consists of life members, annual members, student-associates, subscribing libraries and institutions. The life-membership composition for persons over fifty years of age is ten guineas, for others fifteen guineas. The annual subscription for members is one guinea, for student-associates 10s. 6d. There is at present no entrance fee.
