*Pinyin* is used without tone/diacritical marks, except the following which should use the Wade-Giles system: names such as Chiang Kai-shek, Sun Yat-sen, Taipei and Kuomintang; names of individuals living outside mainland China. Chinese characters should be provided on the first occurrence of each romanization, to assist in proofreading.
