

## STUDIES IN THE RENAISSANCE A call for articles

Studies in the Renaissance is back! We hope to publish the first volume of the revived series in late 1998 or 1999. Consequently, we take the opportunity of this notice to invite members to submit articles for the inaugural volume or any volume thereafter.

SR ended with volume XXI in 1974, the victim of rising printing costs. The plan then, as explained in the Foreword of the final volume, was for the fourth issue each year of Renaissance Quarterly to absorb the articles that would have otherwise appeared in SR. In point of fact, the distinction in content between the first three issues and the last issue each year of RQ eventually evaporated; and though RQ has in the past twenty years published as a matter of course articles that previously would have appeared in SR, the disappearance of SR has sometimes forced us to turn down or discourage from submission excellent articles which were too narrow in scope, too technical, or too long.

Setting pages in-house now allows us to revive SR. The new SR will publish long articles, including occasional articles written in French, German, Italian, or Spanish (with an English précis). SR will also publish texts, bibliographies, *incipitaria*, catalogs of artifacts, and other such scholarly tools. It may even serve from time to time as the venue for a special thematic volume. The style sheet for SR is the same as for RQ, as are the rules for submissions, *i.e.*, three hard copies at the time of submission and a disk at the time of acceptance.
