MANUSCRIPTS

After July 1 all manuscripts and editorial correspondence should be sent to:

Manuscripts should be submitted in quadruplicate. Text, including footnotes and references, should be double spaced with ample (1¼ inch) margins. Footnotes, references, tables, and graphs should follow the main body of the text. Citations that make the author's identity obvious should, to the extent feasible, be deleted from three of the four copies in order to facilitate anonymous reviewing. Each manuscript should contain a short (100 word) abstract and one biographical description of the author(s) should be submitted. A style sheet is available upon request. Manuscripts cannot be returned to authors. Because of the commitment we ask of our outside referees, the *Review* cannot consider for publication manuscripts being considered by other journals, and a submission to the *Review* carries with it the implicit promise that the manuscript will not be submitted elsewhere so long as it is under consideration by the *Review*.
