# The Correspondence of Walt Whitman Volumes IV and V

### Edited by EDWIN HAVILAND MILLER

The final two volumes of *The Correspondence of Walt Whitman* cover the last seven years of the poet's life. Because of the large number of letters extant, they provide an almost day-by-day account of the poet's long wrestling with various aliments, his stoical acceptance of constant pain, yet his continuing energy as evidenced in his supervision and publication of two complete editions of *Leaves of Grass* as well as *November Boughs* and *Good-bye My Fancy*. Many of the new poems were "pot boilers," as he frankly admitted, and the new prose pieces reiterated positions previously stated with greater effectiveness, but there was one gem—"To the Sun-set Breeze."

With declining health and creativity came greater recognition, here and abroad, and a steady stream of visitors to his Camden "shanty." Although critics were by no means unanimous, Whitman, unlike Herman Melville, did not suffer from neglect or indifference. Even his distractors recognized the magnetism of the bard who celebrated the common man.

The present volumes include almost 1400 letters, about seventy per cent of which have never been published. In the Addenda are almost 60 letters which have appeared since the publications of the first three volumes of the *Correspondence*.
