

Fung Global Fellows Program

Princeton University is pleased to announce the call for applications to the **Fung Global Fellows Program at the Princeton Institute for International and Regional Studies** (PIIRS). Each year the program selects six scholars from around the world to be in residence at Princeton for an academic year and to engage in research and discussion around a common theme. Fellowships are awarded to scholars employed outside the United States who are expected to return to their positions, and who have demonstrated outstanding scholarly achievement and exhibit unusual intellectual promise but who are still early in their careers.

During the academic year 2015/16, the theme for the Fung Global Fellows Program will be **“Ethnic Politics and Identities.”** Recent events around the world have highlighted the role of ethnic politics and identities in shaping domestic and international political arenas. The Fung Global Fellows Program seeks applications from scholars who explore the causes, narrative modalities, and consequences of the politicization of ethnic, racial, and national divides from a comparative perspective. Researchers working on any historical period of the modern age or region of the world and from any disciplinary background in the social sciences or humanities are encouraged to apply.

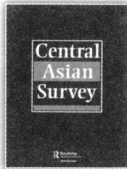
Applications are due on November 1, 2014. To be eligible, applicants must have received their Ph.D. (or equivalent) no earlier than September 1, 2005. Fellowships will be awarded on the strength of a candidate’s proposed research project, the relationship of the project to the program’s theme, the candidate’s scholarly record, and the candidate’s ability to contribute to the intellectual life of the program. Under an arrangement with Routledge, special issues of the journal may be published as self-standing books.

Nationalities Papers is the official journal of the Association for the Study of Nationalities, whose annual conference at Columbia University is the largest international gathering of scholars of nationalism. Many of the journal's articles originate in panels at the conference. The journal is able to tap the international membership of ASN, with their expert knowledge of the region, to review submitted manuscripts.

Electronic Submission. All submissions should be made online at the *Nationalities Papers* ScholarOne Manuscripts site (<http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/CNAP>). New users should first create an account. Once a user is logged onto the site submissions should be made via the Author Centre. Authors should prepare and upload two versions of their manuscript. One should be a complete text, while in the second all document information identifying the author should be removed from files to allow them to be sent anonymously to referees. When uploading files authors will then be able to define the non-anonymous version as "File not for review".

Note to authors. Authors should be mindful of the need to identify and reference quoted material – text, tables, and figures – clearly and consistently, and to secure written permission from the copyright holder as appropriate. <http://tandf.tandf.co.uk/journals/ethics.asp>
