THIS new journal in the field of African studies is to be started in 1962 and will be published three times a year. The editor is Professor Jack Berry of the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, and the Assistant Editors Professor J. H. Greenberg, Columbia University, New York, Professor P.-F. Lacroix of the École Nationale des Langues Orientales Vivantes, Paris, and Dr. Hans Wolff of Michigan State University. Articles will be published in English, French, and German on all aspects of language studies related to the development of scholarship in African languages. The journal is jointly sponsored by the African Language and Area Center, Michigan State University, and the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, with the co-operation of the African Studies Association. Centre d'Étude de droit comparé africain à Lovanium

MGR L. GILLON, Recteur de l'Université Lovanium, a annoncé la création, au sein de la faculté de droit, d'un Centre d'étude de droit comparé africain (C.E.D.C.A.). Le centre s'est assigné comme première tâche de faire l'inventaire des coutumes qui constituent désormais la base du droit commun africain. Cette tâche exige des recherches jurisprudencielles, des enquêtes sur le terrain, la tenue d'archives importantes et l'engagement d'un personnel nombreux. Une pareille organisation déborde les limites du travail de recherche personnel ou collectif des membres d'une faculté.

La direction du C.E.D.C.A. a été confiée au professeur Rubbens, qui sera assisté d'un conseil composé de membres du corps académique de l'Université et de personnalités spécialisées dans les problèmes du droit africain. Les statuts du C.E.D.C.A. prévoient la nomination de membres d'honneur et de membres correspondants, ainsi que l'accueil de stagiaires désireux de se perfectionner en droit africain. Pour réaliser son objet le C.E.D.C.A. compte beaucoup sur la collaboration de toutes les personnes et institutions susceptibles de prendre part à l'œuvre de restructuration juridique de l'Afrique.

African Studies Program—University of Wisconsin

AN African Studies Program was inaugurated at the University of Wisconsin in 1961, designed to provide co-ordinated inter-disciplinary training within the social sciences and humanities, emphasizing the continuity of the African cultural tradition.

Two separate programs are offered. Work for a Master's degree in one of the various disciplines may be combined with supplementary work qualifying for a Certificate in African Studies, the course as a whole taking approximately two years. Candidates for the Ph.D. may qualify for an inter-disciplinary minor field in African Studies. Either program may be co-ordinated with the program in Comparative Tropical History in the Department of History or with the program in Comparative Politics of Developing Societies in the Department of Political Science.

Members of the staff particularly concerned with the program are: Philip D. Curtin (History), Frederick Simoons (Geography), Jan Vansina (History and Anthropology), and Aristide Zolberg (Political Science). Vincent Monteil of the University of Dakar will be Visiting Professor of History in the Fall Semester of 1962-3.

African Studies at the University of Tel-Aviv

THE Department of Middle Eastern and African Studies at the University of Tel-Aviv was established in 1961 under the headship of Professor A. N. Poliak. Particular attention is
