

ALLEN ISAACMAN is Professor of African History and Director of the MacArthur Program on Peace and International Cooperation at the University of Minnesota. He has published several books including Mozambique: the Africanization of an European Institution, the Zambezi Prazos, 1750-1902, which won the 1973 Melville Herskovits Award. He has written extensively on peasants and rural protest in Southern Africa as well as on 20th century Mozambique.

AKIN L. MABOGUNJE is Vice-Chairperson, PAI Associates International, Ibadan; Dean of the Faculty of the Social Sciences; and Director of the Planning Studies Program, University of Ibadan, Nigeria. His major field of academic interest is in urban and regional planning. He has taught in a number of universities, including Northwestern University, the Stockholm School of Economics, and the University of Rio de Janeiro. He has also been a consultant to the Nigerian government and to various international organizations, including the World Bank. President of the International Geographical Union from 1980-84, he has published several book among which are Urbanization in Nigeria, Regional Planning and National Development in Tropical Africa, and The Development Process: A Spatial Perspective.
