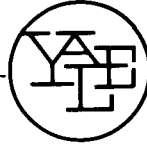

### **Tyndale's New Testament**

Printed in Germany in 1534 and smuggled into England for distribution, Tyndale's masterly translation of the New Testament outraged the clerical establishment by giving the laity direct access to the word of God, in print in English for the first time. Despite its suppression, it ultimately formed the basis of all English bibles (including the Authorised "King James") until after the Second World War. 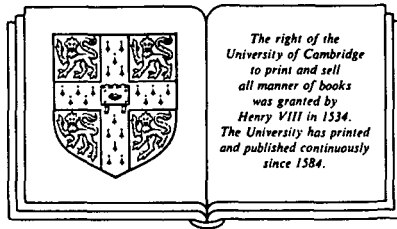
