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The Eleutherian Mills Historical Library of Wilmington, Delaware has published an eighteen page brochure about the holdings of its Pictorial Collections Department. A brief text describes the purposes of the Library as a center for the study of economic, industrial and technological history of the Delaware Valley. It mentions twenty-four picture collections which provide sources for historical research, with descriptive notes regarding nine of them. The twenty-one illustrations, including pictures from the bridge, steel, steam turbine, railroad, chemical, and ship building industries, are indicative of the range of photographs and prints in the Library's collection of 200,000 views.
