An introductory text dealing with the issues of political theory and the history of political thought. In four parts: ancient political speculation among the Hebrews, Greeks, and Romans, and political ideas implicit in the New Testament; major currents of political thought and ideology in the "Christian centuries" (100 A.D. to 1500 A.D.); predominant lines of development from the Renaissance to the end of the 18th century; major political thought since the French Revolution. Political ideas related to historical events and to the general history of science and philosophy throughout; analysis and criticism of each body of ideas. 
