## **OBITUARY**

In a small journal such as this it is impossible to print full obituary notices. In accordance with our usual custom, however, we publish brief notes, as below, on those who have died during the past year:

M. F. ATTER, who was a member of the Oxford University Exploration Club Expedition to West Greenland in the summer of 1935, was drowned by accident in the River Safartok, West Greenland. A description of the expedition appears on page 38.

Two members of the Antarctic Club, Captain V. Berry, and F. W. Burton, have also died during the past year. The former, who was a member of the Nimrod Expedition, met his death as a result of an accident; while the latter, who took part in the Discovery relief expedition on board the Morning, and who also served in the Terra Nova Expedition, was washed overboard in a gale in the North Sea on November 19. 1935.

W. J. A. GRANT, who died on March 10, 1935, aged 83, took part in the *Pandora* relief expedition in 1875, and visited the Arctic nine times. He was a member of the party which discovered Alexandra Land, Franz Josef Land, and has a cape called after him. The death of Major-General A. W. GREELY has already been alluded to in the Foreword.

Count CARL P.O. MOLTKE, who has died in Denmark, was a member of Garde's Expedition to Greenland, and was with him on the Inland Ice in 1893, and at Juliane-haab, in 1893—4.

Captain LUIS PARDO, who died on February 22, 1935, was in command of the tug Yelcho, which rescued the Shackleton Expedition from Elephant Island in 1915.

The death of W. P. WOOLLEY on March 28, 1935, aged 84, removes one of the few surviving members of the Nares Expedition of 1875. He served on board the Alert, and retired from the Navy with the rank of Chief Petty Officer.
