The Anglo-American Conference is managed by the Institute of Historical Research in consultation with a committee of scholars from both sides of the Atlantic. Its tradition, however, has been multi-national ever since the informal meetings of historians in the University of London in 1921 which gave rise to the first Conference. Since then, the Conference has met almost annually except for a break during the Second World War. Both the subject matter and the personnel of the meetings draw on historical scholarship from all over the world and from many different fields and periods of history. THIRD MEDLICOTT SYMPOSIUM at the
University of Exeter,
23-25 July 1995

Theme: International Communism and the Communist International, 1919-43

The Department of History and Archaeology at the University of Exeter holds regular symposia in commemoration of the work of Professor W. N. Medlicott, who was Professor of History at the then University College of the South West of England between 1946 and 1953. The first Medlicott Symposium, held in 1985, was on 'Intelligence and International Relations, 1900–1945'; the second, on 'The Origins of NATO', took place in 1989. To continue this series, Andrew Thorpe and Tim Rees are arranging a symposium in July 1995 on 'International Communism and the Communist International, 1919–43'. There will be papers on the Comintern itself; on relations between Comintern and Communist parties in particular countries or regions; and on various aspects of Comintern policy. With the opening of new archives, especially in Moscow, the conference should provide a new look at a topic of enduring interest.
