





Study in St. Louis, Senegal

Delve into Senegalese life and cultures for the academic year.



You will attend classes alongside Senegalese students at the Université Gaston Berger and learn about your surroundings firsthand through a fieldwork project. The St. Louis program offers students a unique opportunity to conduct research. In addition, you will study the most widely spoken Senegalese language, Wolof.

The Université Gaston Berger is home to approximately 2000 students and offers a modern campus designed in the traditional Sahelian style. From the university, a fifteen-minute bus ride delivers you to the heart of St. Louis, an island in the Senegal River.

To be eligible to participate in the St. Louis, Senegal Academic Year program, students must:

- Have at least Junior standing (54 credits). Open to graduate students.
- Have at least a 2.5 GPA and be in good academic standing
- Have taken a minimum of 4 semesters of university-level French or equivalent, with a GPA of 3.0 in French courses.
- Be a registered student at any college or university.


Program Duration: Academic Year; mid October to late June

Classroom Language: French. Wolof is commonly spoken outside of the classroom

Classroom Subjects: Letters and humanities, including French and African languages and literature; social sciences; law and political science; economics and business.

Housing: Students live with Senegalese roommates in university dormitories. Housing and meals are included in the program fee.




