The Wise Persons recommended ten improvements to the European Court of Human Rights including establishment of a new judicial filtering mechanism; enhancing the authority of the Court's case law in states parties; and improvement of domestic remedies for redressing violations of the Convention.


Permanent Court of Arbitration: Eritrea-Ethiopia Boundary Commission Statement


The Conflict Between Core Labour Rights and International Economic Law Christine Kaufmann

In a world of work that has changed dramatically over the last few years, states see themselves confronted with new actors and conflicting international legal obligations. This book examines the tensions between core labour rights as defined by the International Labour Organisation, and the interests of international economic institutions (e.g. WTO, IMF, World Bank, OECD). It provides an analysis of the legal interactions between international regulations and state policy with regard to potential regulatory conflicts, at both the horizontal and vertical level. The study suggests a model of multilevel consistency as a way of reconciling the highly specialised and fragmented legal systems of core labour rights on the one hand, and trade liberalisation on the other, to form the coherent framework of a consistent legal order. Its detailed analysis and recommendations are designed for both academic readers and practitioners in international organisations and governments.

In the wake of the events of September 11th 2001, the task of balancing issues of security with a respect for fundamental human rights has emerged as one of the key challenges facing governments throughout the world. Although the issues raised by the rise of security have been the subject of considerable academic interest, to date much of the debate surrounding the impact of security on human rights has taken place within particular disciplinary confines. International Organisations and the Law of Treaties Catherine Brölmann

This book deals with the nature of international organisations and the tension between their legal nature and the system of classic, state-based international law. This tension is important in theory and practice, particularly when organisations are brought under the rule of international law and thus have to be designated as legal subjects. The position is complicated by what the author terms 'the institutional veil', comparable to the corporate veil found in corporate law. The book focuses on the law of treaties, as this pre-eminently 'horizontal' branch of international law brings out the problem particularly clearly. This is a profound and penetrating examination of the character of international organisations and their place in international law, and will be an important source for anyone interested in the future role of organisations in the international legal system.

Guidelines for Submission of Documents

The ILM Office welcomes any effort to bring suitable documents to the Office's attention. Electronic files or web links are required for publication, although printed texts can be used for initial deliberations regarding republication.

The authenticity (*i.e.* official version status) of submitted documents must be easily verifiable. This is facilitated by submitting files or print versions which are clearly attributable to the original source, or by providing links to documents on the original source's official website.

If the official version of a document is not available in English, an unofficial translation is acceptable. The original text must accompany such a translation.

Introductory Notes

Introductory Notes are brief articles from one to three pages in length which are intended to provide background information for a document reproduced in ILM.

For example, an Introductory Note for a treaty might include a short history of the negotiations, the dates of signature and entry into force. An Introductory Note for legislation would give its history and international significance, while one for judicial proceedings would provide the background of the case.

Acceptance of Materials and Corrections

Print submissions cannot be returned. Translators and others submitting material will be notified of the acceptance of their document for publication.

Once a translation or Introductory Note has been accepted for reproduction, The American Society of International Law will send a publication agreement to the author.

Translators and Introductory Note Authors shall be acknowledged in *International Legal Materials*.

In some cases minor editorial or typographical alterations may be made without contacting the author or translator. Major corrections will be sent to the author or translator for approval. Corrected Introductory Notes or translations must be returned within the time specified.
