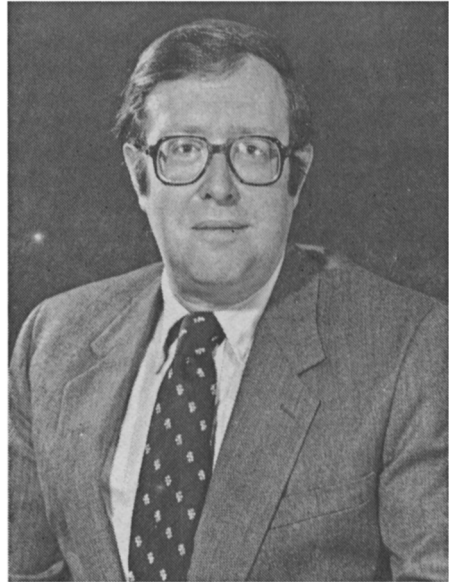

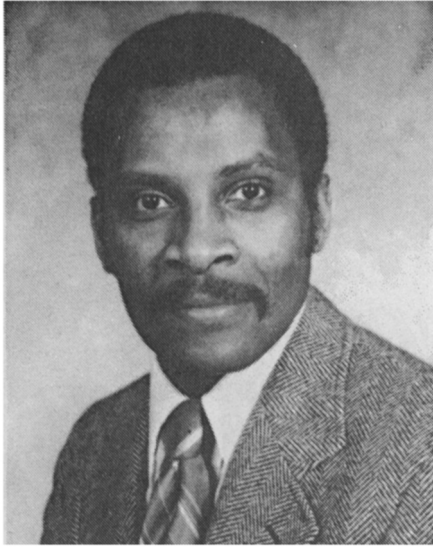
the U.S. Department of Justice; formerly associate chairman and associate professor, Department of Politics, Catholic University of America.

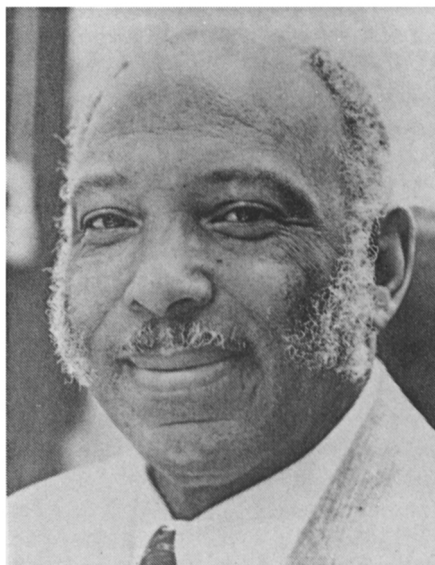
