Ruminant health and welfare survey

Ruminant Health and Welfare (RH&W) is an independent, industry-based body, set-up in 2020 to tackle disease in cattle, sheep and goats in the UK. The aims of RH&W are to:

i) Prevent, manage or eradicate those endemic diseases with the greatest effect on health, welfare and productivity;

ii) Identify opportunities for farm-level interventions that support our ambition of being among the world leaders in animal welfare;

(iii) Address inherent issues in current and future farming systems that could lead to health and welfare or reputational challenges; and

(iv) Champion high health and welfare standards, and priorities relating to domestic or overseas markets for the four nations.

RH&W functions as a committee within the Agriculture and Horticulture Development Board (AHDB, England) but, recognising that disease does not have geographical boundaries, also works collaboratively with Quality Meat Scotland (QMS), Hybu Cig Cymru/Meat Promotion Wales (HCC) and Northern Ireland's Livestock and Meat Commission.

One of the first tasks of RH&W was to conduct a 'grassroots' survey with the aim of "establishing the disease, health and welfare priorities of those who work with cattle and sheep on a daily basis." Six hundred and sixty-two responses were received from farmers and professionals working with cattle (73% beef, 27% dairy), and hill, upland and lowland sheep (17, 28 and 55%, respectively).

As well as considering diseases, respondents were also asked to respond on 'syndromes' – defined in the survey as "broader conditions caused by a range of potential factors and commonly associated with particular stages in the production cycle."

Opening the Report, Nigel Miller (RH&W chairman) notes that "Clearly disease is often the visible component of a syndrome with nutrition, environmental factors and genetics also involved at times. Moving health management to a whole system approach can open the door to more significant progress." The top diseases and syndromes impacting ruminant production and welfare in the UK were found to be:

RH&W plan to host at least one workshop during summer 2021 at which farmers, vets, researchers and industry organisations/stakeholders will be able to discuss the survey results. It is hoped that participants will be able to identify "...how the four nations can work together to deliver a new operating environment to deliver fresh and tangible progress against these (disease/syndrome) priorities. A range of possible interventions will be identified based on relevance, cost and likelihood of adoption."
