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Latin American Teaching Fellowships

Fellowship and internship opportunities under the Latin American Teaching Fellowships program are available for the 1970–71 academic year. Applicants should be graduate students in the social and natural sciences who have completed all preliminary requirements except dissertation for the PhD, or recent recipients of LLB or MBA degrees. Fluency in Spanish or Portuguese is required prior to departure for Latin America. L.A.T.F. Fellows spend approximately half time teaching in a Latin American university, generally under the immediate supervision of a senior Latin American professor. The other half time is available for research and/or internship activities. More than 60 L.A.T.F. Fellows have been teaching in universities in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Mexico, Peru, Uruguay and Venezuela. Applications and further information can be obtained by writing: Gary A. 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Each year the Department of Anthropology of the American Museum of Natural History sponsors Ogden Mills Fellowships, for research in residence at the museum.
