GUIDE FOR AUTHORS

This Journal will consider for publication original papers concerning research, education, organization, planning and delivery of emergency and critical care medicine, with emphasis on the relevance for disaster situations.

Manuscripts and correspondence concerning editorial matters are to be sent to: Peter Safar, M.D., Editor, Journal of the WAEDM, Resuscitation Research Center, University of Pittsburgh, 3434 5th Avenue, Pittsburgh, PA 15260, USA, tel: 412/624-6735.

Manuscripts will receive peer review by at least two persons in a confidential manner. Usually the author will be notified about decision on his manuscript within two months of its receipt. Starting 1986, accepted manuscripts will be published within 6-18 months of acceptance. All manuscripts must be typed in English, be not under consideration for publication by another journal, and be submitted with the understanding that they might be edited. Authors will receive galleys and/or page proofs on which only minor changes may be made. Each principal author of an accepted paper will receive a gratis copy of the journal number in which his paper appears. Accepted manuscripts may not be published elsewhere without the written permission of the editor-in-chief. Any material previously published elsewhere must be accompanied by written consent of author and publisher. Research on human subjects should include a statement indicating approval by the institution's human research committee.

Manuscripts. Please submit an original and two copies, typed double-spaced on 22x28 cm (8%x11 inch) paper. Please send a cover letter indicating name, address and phone number of the author responsible for correspondence. Manuscripts should be clearly written and, where appropriate, include abstract, introduction, methods, results, discussion, conclusions, and references. With few exceptions, manuscripts should not exceed 4,000 words of text. Tables should be numbered and cited in the text. Figures should be professionally drawn, submitted in the form of glossy photos and

cited in the text. Legends to figures should be typed on separate sheets. There should be a title page including the title of the contribution; the authors' names, highest degrees, departments and institutions; the name of the organization and date of the meeting if the paper has been presented; and the name, address and phone number of the author responsible for correspondence concerning the manuscript. An abstract, no more than I page double-spaced, should state the purpose, procedures, results and conclusions. An introduction may include objectives and hypotheses (questions). The methods section should include, if appropriate, experimental design, models, procedures and data analysis. The results should include data, perhaps reinforced by tables and figures. For numerical data — if appropriate — give mean values, standard deviations (or standard errors) and/or ranges, and indicate the results of statistical analyses of differences and correlations. The discussion should state the gaps in knowledge filled by this study, advantages and limitations of methodology used, statistical, clinical and other significance, new hypotheses (if indicated), and conclusions and recommendations, as appropriate. In a final paragraph you may acknowledge individuals who have contributed. Abbreviations and symbols should conform to international standards (Ann. Int. Med. 96:766, 1982).

References should be cited in the text, using the same number every time the reference appears in the text. List references at the end of the paper, for research papers in numbered consecutive sequence as they appear in the text; and for review papers, in alphabetic sequence. List up to three authors, if more, "et al". Use index medicus style. For papers:
