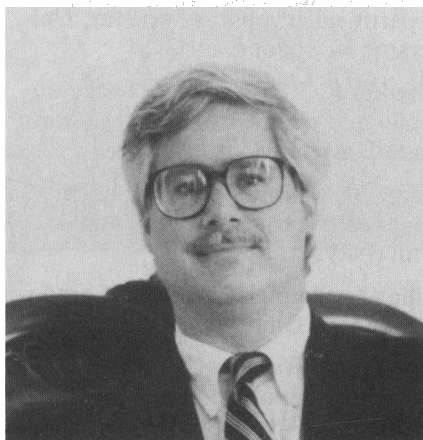
Joseph Kruzel, department of political science, Ohio State University, is on leave to serve as Deputy Assistant Secretary in the United States Department of Defense.
