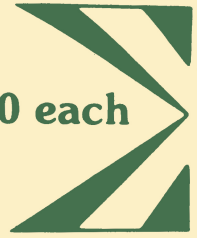

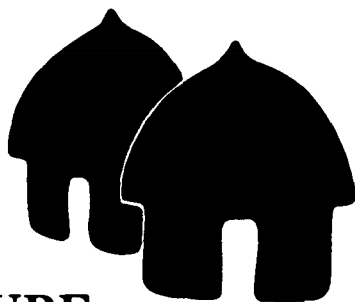

THE POLITICS OF AGRICULTURE IN TROPICAL AFRICA

In tropical Africa, agricultural production is the main source of subsistence for the rapidly growing rural and urban populations. It is also a provider of key commodities for the foreign trade that brings in the technology and industrial goods that foster growth. So it is no surprise that the increasing failure of growth in the agricultural sector has kept African nations in a continuous state of underdevelopment.

This remarkable volume cites actual experiments to illustrate how underdevelopment is unintentionally maintained, and even solidified, by the very processes implemented to improve agricultural production. Eleven case studies clearly demonstrate that transnational assistance organizations often only aggravate the problem through their agricultural policy intervention. The diverse contributors explore local, national, and transnational dimensions of the two-way relationship between agricultural production and politics—explaining the complex ways in which political motives and political means influence agricultural policy and shape patterns of production.
