

Kent V. Flannery, Joyce Marcus, and Robert G. Reynolds

The authors use the archaeological record of 5,000 years of llama and llama herder behavior in the Peruvian Andes, ethnographies of contemporary Peruvian llama herders, zoological studies of contemporary camelid behavior in the Andes, and advanced techniques of computer simulation to arrive at a model which works well to explain much that has previously been confusing about both animal herd dynamics and the evolution of human societies. Four variant sociobiological models of the coevolution of human and animal behavior which are currently being advanced by evolutionary biologists and social theorists are tested and shown to be poor fits with the observed data. Various perils inherent in modeling long-term evolutionary behavior on the basis of short-term observation are demonstrated in a cautionary way.
