# Large Time Behavior for the Cubic Nonlinear Schrödinger Equation 

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Abstract. We consider the Cauchy problem for the cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation in one space dimension

$$
\begin{cases}i u_{t}+\frac{1}{2} u_{x x}+\bar{u}^{3}=0, & t \in \mathbf{R}, x \in \mathbf{R}  \tag{1}\\ u(0, x)=u_{0}(x), & x \in \mathbf{R}\end{cases}
$$

Cubic type nonlinearities in one space dimension heuristically appear to be critical for large time. We study the global existence and large time asymptotic behavior of solutions to the Cauchy problem (1). We prove that if the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$ are small and such that $\sup _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\arg \mathcal{F} u_{0}(\xi)-\frac{\pi n}{2}\right|<$ $\frac{\pi}{8}$ for some $n \in \mathbf{Z}$, and $\inf _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\mathcal{F} u_{0}(\xi)\right|>0$, then the solution has an additional logarithmic timedecay in the short range region $|x| \leq \sqrt{t}$. In the far region $|x|>\sqrt{t}$ the asymptotics have a quasilinear character.

## 1 Introduction

The purpose of this paper is to study the global existence and large time asymptotic behavior of solutions to the Cauchy problem for the cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation in one space dimension

$$
\begin{cases}\mathcal{L} u+\bar{u}^{3}=0, & t \in \mathbf{R}, x \in \mathbf{R}  \tag{2}\\ u(0, x)=u_{0}(x), & x \in \mathbf{R}\end{cases}
$$

where $\mathcal{L}=i \partial_{t}+\frac{1}{2} \partial_{x}^{2}$. Cubic type nonlinearities in one space dimension heuristically appear to be critical for large time. Cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equations have wide physical applications (see [15], [16], [17]).

There are some works (see [2], [3], [6], [8], [12], [14], [19], [20], [23]) concerning the large time asymptotics of solutions to the nonlinear Schrödinger equations with cubic nonlinearities which have the self-conjugate property: $\mathcal{N}\left(e^{i \theta} u\right)=e^{i \theta} \mathcal{N}(u)$ for all $\theta \in \mathbf{R}$. Recent developments in this direction can be seen in [11], where we studied the asymptotic behavior in time and scattering problem for the solutions to the Cauchy problem for the derivative cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation $\mathcal{L} u=$ $\mathcal{N}_{1}(u)$ with nonlinearity

[^0]where the coefficients $\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{6} \in \mathbf{R}$, and $\lambda_{2}, \lambda_{3}, \lambda_{4}, \lambda_{5} \in \mathbf{C}$ are such that $\lambda_{2}-\lambda_{3} \in \mathbf{R}$ and $\lambda_{4}-\lambda_{5} \in \mathbf{R}$. We proved the global in time existence and large time asymptotics of solutions to the corresponding Cauchy problem. In paper [9] we considered the cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation $\mathcal{L} u=\mathcal{N}(u)$ without a self-conjugate property, when the nonlinearity can be represented in the form of the full derivative $\mathcal{N}(u)=$ $i \lambda_{1}\left(|u|^{2} u\right)_{x}+\lambda_{2}\left(u^{3}\right)_{x}+\lambda_{3}\left(\bar{u}^{2} u\right)_{x}+\lambda_{4}\left(\bar{u}^{3}\right)_{x}, \lambda_{1} \in \mathbf{R}, \lambda_{2}, \lambda_{3}, \lambda_{4} \in \mathbf{C}$. We proved the nonexistence of the usual scattering states if $\lambda_{1} \neq 0$ and if $\lambda_{1}=0$ we proved the existence of the usual scattering states. In [9] we used the techniques developed in our previous work [7], where we introduced an appropriate representation of the solution and instead of the operator $\mathcal{J}=x+i t \partial_{x}$ we used the dilation operator $\mathcal{J} \partial_{x}^{-1}=x+2 t \partial_{t} \partial_{x}^{-1}$, where $\partial_{x}^{-1}=\int_{-\infty}^{x} d x$. The nonlinear Schrödinger equation with cubic nonlinearities, containing at least one derivative was studied in paper [18], where the large time asymptotics of solutions was found for small initial data $u_{0} \in$ $\mathbf{H}^{3,4}$, where $\mathbf{H}^{m, k}=\left\{\phi \in \mathbf{L}^{2}:\|\phi\|_{m, k} \equiv\left\|\langle x\rangle^{k}\langle i \partial\rangle^{m} \phi\right\|_{\mathbf{L}^{2}}<\infty\right\}$ is the weighted Sobolev space, $m, k \in \mathbf{R},\langle x\rangle=\sqrt{1+x^{2}}$. The special nonlinearities $u u_{x}^{2}$ or $\overline{u u_{x}^{2}}$ were considered in [22] and the global existence of small solutions was shown by a different method from [18] and ours (he used the method of the normal forms of Shatah [21]) under different assumptions on the initial data, roughly speaking, $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{L}^{1}$ for the case $u u_{x}^{2}$ and $(1-\Delta)^{3} u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{L}^{1}$ for the case ${\overline{u u_{x}}}^{2}$. Recently in paper [10] we improved the previous result of paper [18] by using much more simple and general approach and estimates in a natural function space. In [10] we studied the Cauchy problem for the cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation $\mathcal{L} u=\mathcal{N}_{1}(u)+\mathcal{N}_{2}(u)$, where the nonlinear term $\mathcal{N}_{1}$ is given by (3) and the nonlinearity

does not satisfy the self-conjugate property, here the coefficients $a_{j}, b_{j}, \mu_{l} \in \mathbf{C}, j=$ $1,2,3, l=1, \ldots, 5$. Thus the nonlinearity $\mathcal{N}_{1}+\mathcal{N}_{2}$ includes all possible cubic terms with integer powers of $u, \bar{u}, u_{x}$ and $\bar{u}_{x}$ and contains at least one derivative of the unknown function. We proved that if the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{3,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{2,1}$ with sufficiently small norm $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{3,0}+\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{2,1}$, then there exists a unique global solution $u \in$ $\mathbf{C}\left(\mathbf{R} ; \mathbf{H}^{3,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{2,1}\right)$ of the Cauchy problem for the cubic nonlinear Schrödinger equation $\mathcal{L} u=\mathcal{N}_{1}(u)+\mathcal{N}_{2}(u)$, and there exists a unique modified final state $W_{+} \in \mathbf{L}^{\infty}$ such that the asymptotics

u(t, x)=M \mathcal{D} W_{+} e^{i\left|W_{+}\right|^{2} \Lambda \log t}+O\left(\varepsilon^{3} t^{-\frac{1}{2}-\alpha}\right)
$$

is valid for $t \rightarrow \infty$ uniformly with respect to $x \in \mathbf{R}$, where $M(t)=e^{\frac{i x^{2}}{2 t}}, \mathcal{D}(t)$ is the dilation operator $\mathcal{D}(t) \phi=\frac{1}{\sqrt{i t}} \phi(\dot{\bar{t}}), \Lambda(\xi)=\lambda_{1}-\left(\lambda_{2}-\lambda_{3}\right) \xi+\left(\lambda_{4}-\lambda_{5}\right) \xi^{2}-\lambda_{6} \xi^{3}$ and $\alpha \in\left(0, \frac{1}{4}\right)$.

Thus considering all possible twenty types of cubic nonlinearities: $u^{3},|u|^{2} u, u \bar{u}^{2}$, $\bar{u}^{3}, u^{2} u_{x},|u|^{2} u_{x}, u^{2} \bar{u}_{x}, \bar{u}^{2} u_{x},|u|^{2} \bar{u}_{x}, \bar{u}^{2} \bar{u}_{x}, u u_{x}^{2}, \bar{u} u_{x}^{2}, u\left|u_{x}\right|^{2}, \bar{u}\left|u_{x}\right|^{2}, u \bar{u}_{x}^{2}, \bar{u} \bar{u}_{x}^{2}, u_{x}^{3},\left|u_{x}\right|^{2} u_{x}$, $\left|u_{x}\right|^{2} \bar{u}_{x}$, and $\bar{u}_{x}^{3}$, containing integer powers of $u, \bar{u}, u_{x}$ and $\bar{u}_{x}$, we can see that as far as we know there are no results on the global existence and large time asymptotics
of solutions for the following three types of nonlinearities $u^{3}, \bar{u}^{3}$ and $u \bar{u}^{2}$ which do not satisfy the self-conjugate property. For the nonlinearity $\lambda|u|^{2} u$ with complex $\lambda$, the large time behavior of solutions is also unknown. In the present paper we make an attempt to cover this gap considering the Cauchy problem (2) with nonlinearity $\bar{u}^{3}$. We believe that the other two types of nonlinearities $u^{3}$ and $u \bar{u}^{2}$ could be also considered via some modification of our method.

To state our result precisely, we give now some notations. We denote the linear Schrödinger evolution group by

\mathcal{U}(t) \phi=\mathcal{F}^{-1} e^{-\frac{i}{2} t \xi^{2}} \mathcal{F} \phi=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi i t}} \int e^{\frac{i}{2 t}(x-y)^{2}} \phi(y) d y=M(t) \mathcal{D}(t) \mathcal{F} M(t) \phi
$$

where $M(t)=e^{\frac{i x^{2}}{2 t}}, \mathcal{D}(t)$ is the dilation operator $\mathcal{D}(t) \phi=\frac{1}{\sqrt{i t}} \phi(\dot{\bar{t}}), \mathcal{F} \phi \equiv \hat{\phi}=$ $\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int e^{-i x \xi} \phi(x) d x$ denotes the Fourier transform of the function $\phi$. Then the inverse Fourier transformation is $\mathcal{F}^{-1} \phi=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int e^{i x \xi} \phi(\xi) d \xi, \mathcal{D}(t)^{-1}=i \mathcal{D}\left(\frac{1}{t}\right)$ and

\mathcal{U}(-t) \phi=i \bar{M}(t) \mathcal{F}^{-1} \mathcal{D}\left(\frac{1}{t}\right) \bar{M}(t)
$$

We essentially use the estimates involving the operator

$$
\mathcal{J}=x+i t \partial_{x}=U(t) x U(-t)=i t M(t) \partial_{x} \bar{M}(t)
$$

to prove the main result.
We denote the usual Lebesgue space $\mathbf{L}^{p}=\left\{\phi \in \mathbf{S}^{\prime} ;\|\phi\|_{p}<\infty\right\}$, where the norm $\|\phi\|_{p}=\left(\int_{\mathbf{R}}|\phi(x)|^{p} d x\right)^{1 / p}$ if $1 \leq p<\infty$ and $\|\phi\|_{\infty}=$ ess. $\sup \{|\phi(x)| ; x \in \mathbf{R}\}$ if $p=\infty$. For simplicity we write $\|\cdot\|=\|\cdot\|_{2}=\|\cdot\|_{L^{2}}$. Weighted Sobolev space is $\mathbf{H}^{m, k}=\left\{\phi \in \mathbf{S}^{\prime}:\|\phi\|_{m, k} \equiv\left\|\langle x\rangle^{k}\langle i \partial\rangle^{m} \phi\right\|<\infty\right\}, m, k \in \mathbf{R},\langle x\rangle=\sqrt{1+x^{2}}$. Different positive constants we denote by the same letter $C$. We use greek letters for Fourier space variables to make notations more transparent.

The aim of the paper is to prove the following result.
Theorem 1.1 Let the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$ have a sufficiently small norm $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{1,0}+\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{0,1} \equiv \varepsilon>0$. Also we assume that $\sup _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\arg \hat{u}_{0}(\xi)-\frac{\pi n}{2}\right|<\frac{\pi}{8}-\varepsilon$ for some $n \in \mathbf{Z}$, and $\inf _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\hat{u}_{0}(\xi)\right|>C \varepsilon>0$. Then there exists a unique solution $u \in \mathbf{C}\left([0, \infty), \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}\right)$ of the Cauchy problem (2). Moreover there exists a unique final state $W_{+} \in \mathbf{L}^{\infty}$ such that the following asymptotics for $t \rightarrow \infty$

u(t, x)= & e^{\frac{i x^{2}}{2 t}} \frac{1}{\sqrt{i t}} \frac{\left|W_{+}\left(\frac{x}{t}\right)\right|}{\sqrt{1+\frac{2 \pi}{\sqrt{3}}\left|W_{+}\left(\frac{x}{t}\right)\right|^{2} \log \left(\min \left(t,\left\langle\frac{t^{2}}{x^{2}}\right\rangle\right)\right)}} \\
& +O\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{t} \log \log (t+1) \sqrt{1+\frac{2 \pi}{\sqrt{3}}\left|W_{+}\left(\frac{x}{t}\right)\right|^{2} \log \left(\min \left(t,\left\langle\frac{t^{2}}{x^{2}}\right\rangle\right)\right)}}\right) \tag{4}
\end{align*}
$$

is valid uniformly with respect to $x \in \mathbf{R}$.

Remark 1.2 Note that the solution $u$ given by the asymptotic formula (4) gains an additional logarithmic time-decay in the short range region $|x| \leq \sqrt{t}$. In the far region $|x|>\sqrt{t}$ the asymptotics has a quasi-linear character.

We now give a sketch of the proof. As is well-known it is very important to estimate the norm $\|\mathcal{J} u\|$ to obtain the large time decay estimates of the solution. If we apply operator $\mathcal{J}$ to equation (2) we get

$$
\mathcal{L} \mathcal{J} u+\bar{u}^{2} \bar{\partial} u+4 i t \partial_{x}\left(\bar{u}^{3}\right)=0 .
$$

The last term in the left-hand side of the above equation has an explicit time growth. To eliminate this term we apply (see Lemma 2.1 below) the method analogous to that of normal forms by Shatah [21]. By making use of the identity given by Lemma 2.1 we get the estimate

\|\mathcal{J} u\| \leq C \varepsilon+C \varepsilon^{3} t^{\frac{1}{4}}\left(1+\varepsilon^{2} \log t\right)^{-\frac{3}{2}} .
$$

Then to obtain optimal time decay estimates of the solution in the uniform norm we need to estimate the function $v(t)=\mathcal{F} \mathcal{U}(-t) u(t)$. Here we use the method similar to our paper [5]. Roughly speaking, we get from equation (2)

v_{t}(t, \xi)=-\frac{1}{t} e^{-\frac{2}{3} i t \xi^{2}} \bar{v}^{3}(t, \xi)+O\left(\varepsilon^{5} t^{-1}\left(1+\varepsilon^{2} \log t\right)^{-\frac{5}{2}}\right) .
$$

In order to eliminate the first divergent term in the right-hand side of the above equation we change the dependent variable $v(t, \xi)=f(t, \xi) e^{-\phi+i g}$ for $|\xi| \leq 1$, where $\phi$ and $g$ are real valued functions such that

\phi_{t}=-\frac{1}{t} e^{-2 \phi} \Re\left(e^{-\frac{2}{3} i t \xi^{2}-4 i g} \bar{f}^{3}(t, \xi) f^{-1}(t, \xi)\right)
$$

and

$$
g_{t}=-\frac{1}{t} e^{-2 \phi} \Im\left(e^{-\frac{2}{3} i t \xi^{2}-4 i g} \bar{f}^{3}(t, \xi) f^{-1}(t, \xi)\right)
$$

with initial conditions $\phi(2, \xi)=0, g(2, \xi)=0$, then we obtain a more rapid time decay for $f$

$$
f_{t}(t, \xi)=O\left(\varepsilon^{5} t^{-1} e^{\phi}\left(1+\varepsilon^{2} \log t\right)^{-\frac{5}{2}}\right)
$$

hence $f$ can be easily estimated and as the result we obtain the asymptotic formula (4).

The rest of the paper is organized as follows. In Section 2 we give some preliminary estimates. In Lemma 2.1 we prove an identity which is an analog of the method of normal forms by Shatah. In Lemmas $2.2-2.4$ we prepare large time estimates of the solution via the operator $\mathscr{J}$ and estimates of the operator $\mathcal{F U}(-t)$ acting to the nonlinearity of equation (2). Lemma 2.5 is devoted to the large time asymptotics of the nonlinearity in the $\mathcal{F U}(-t)$ representation. Section 3 is devoted to the proof of Theorem 1.1.

## 2 Preliminary Estimates

First we derive an analog of the method of normal forms by Shatah. Define the trilinear operators $Q_{k}$ by the Fourier transformation

where $\xi_{1}=\frac{\xi}{3}+\eta-\zeta, \xi_{2}=\frac{\xi}{3}-\eta-\zeta, \xi_{3}=\frac{\xi}{3}+2 \zeta, \Lambda=\frac{2}{3} \xi^{2}+\eta^{2}+3 \zeta^{2}$.
Lemma 2.1 We have the identity

t^{n} \bar{u}^{3}=- & i \mathcal{L} t^{n+1} Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u})-t^{n} Q_{2}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u})-(n-1) t^{n} Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u}) \\
& -3 i t^{n+1} Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \overline{\mathcal{L} u}) \tag{5}
\end{align*}

where $n \geq 0$.
Proof Applying the operator $\mathcal{K}=\mathcal{F U}(-t)=e^{\frac{i}{2} t \xi^{2}} \mathcal{F}$, then for the function $v(t)=$ $\mathcal{K} u(t)$ we get

\mathcal{K}\left(\bar{u}^{3}\right)=\frac{1}{\pi} \iint e^{i t \Lambda} \overline{v\left(t,-\xi_{1}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{2}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{3}\right)} d \eta d \zeta
$$

where $\xi_{1}=\frac{\xi}{3}+\eta-\zeta, \xi_{2}=\frac{\xi}{3}-\eta-\zeta, \xi_{3}=\frac{\xi}{3}+2 \zeta, \Lambda=\frac{1}{2}\left(\xi^{2}+\sum_{j=1}^{3} \xi_{j}^{2}\right)=\frac{2}{3} \xi^{2}+\eta^{2}+3 \zeta^{2}$. Using the identity

$$
e^{i t \Lambda}=\partial_{t}\left(t(1+i t \Lambda)^{-1} e^{i t \Lambda}\right)-(1+i t \Lambda)^{-2} e^{i t \Lambda}+(1+i t \Lambda)^{-1} e^{i t \Lambda}
$$

we obtain

\mathcal{K}\left(\bar{u}^{3}\right)=\partial_{t} & \left(\frac{t}{\pi} \iint(1+i t \Lambda)^{-1} e^{i t \Lambda} \overline{v\left(t,-\xi_{1}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{2}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{3}\right)} d \eta d \zeta\right) \\
& -\frac{1}{\pi} \iint(1+i t \Lambda)^{-2} e^{i t \Lambda} \overline{v\left(t,-\xi_{1}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{2}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{3}\right)} d \eta d \zeta \\
& +\frac{1}{\pi} \iint(1+i t \Lambda)^{-1} e^{i t \Lambda} \overline{v\left(t,-\xi_{1}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{2}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{3}\right)} d \eta d \zeta \\
& -\frac{3 t}{\pi} \iint(1+i t \Lambda)^{-1} e^{i t \Lambda} \overline{v\left(t,-\xi_{1}\right) v\left(t,-\xi_{2}\right) v_{t}\left(t,-\xi_{3}\right)} d \eta d \zeta
\end{aligned}
$$

Since $\mathcal{K}^{-1} \partial_{t} \mathcal{K}=-i \mathcal{L}$, applying the inverse operator $\mathcal{K}^{-1}$, we return to the function $u(t, x)$ to have

\bar{u}^{3}=-i \mathcal{L} t Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u})-Q_{2}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u})+Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \bar{u})-3 i t Q_{1}(\bar{u}, \bar{u}, \overline{\mathcal{L} u})
$$

hence via the relation $t^{n} \mathcal{L}=\mathcal{L} t^{n}-i n t^{n-1}$ we get the identity (5). Lemma 2.1 is proved.

Denote $\mathcal{K}=\mathcal{F U}(-t), E=e^{\frac{i t}{2} \xi^{2}}$.

Lemma 2.2 We have the estimates

\|\mathcal{D}(t) \mathcal{F}(M-1) \mathcal{U}(-t) u(t)\|_{p} \leq C t^{-\frac{3}{4}+\frac{1}{2 p}}\|\mathcal{J} u\|

where $2 \leq p \leq \infty$,

\left\|\partial_{\xi} E^{\frac{4}{3}} \mathcal{K} \bar{u}^{3}(t)\right\| \leq C\|u\|_{\infty}^{2}\|\mathcal{J} u\|
$$

and

\left\|\psi^{3} \mathcal{K} \bar{u}^{3}(t)\right\|_{\infty} \leq C t^{-1}\left(\|\psi \mathcal{K} u\|_{\infty}+t^{-\frac{1}{4}}\|\mathcal{J} u\|\right)^{3}+C t^{-\frac{1}{4}}\|u\|_{\infty}^{2}\|\mathcal{J} u\|

for all $t>0$, where $\psi=\left\langle t \xi^{2}\right\rangle^{-\gamma}, \gamma>0$.
Proof Since $|M-1| \leq C \frac{|x|}{\sqrt{t}}$ for all $x \in \mathbf{R}, t>0$ we obtain

\|\mathcal{D}(t) \mathcal{F}(M-1) \mathcal{U}(-t) u(t)\| & =\|(M-1) \mathcal{U}(-t) u(t)\| \\
& \leq C t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\|x \mathcal{U}(-t) u(t)\|=C t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\|\mathcal{J} u\| .

since $\partial_{\xi} \mathcal{K}=\mathcal{K} \mathcal{J}$ and $\|\mathcal{K} \phi\|=\|\phi\|$. Similarly

& \leq C t^{-\frac{3}{4}}\left\|\left\langle t \xi^{2}\right\rangle^{\delta} \iint e^{i t S} A_{k} \Phi d \eta d \zeta\right\|_{\infty} \\
& \leq C t^{-\frac{7}{4}}\left(\|\psi \mathcal{K} u\|_{\infty}+t^{-\frac{1}{4}}\|\partial u\|\right)^{3} .
\end{aligned}

## 3 Proof of Theorem 1.1

By virtue of the method of papers [1], [4], [13], [19] we obtain the existence of local solutions in the functional space $\mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$. Denote

where $\mathcal{K}=\mathcal{F} U(-t), \psi(t, \xi)=\left\langle t \xi^{2}\right\rangle^{-\gamma}, \gamma \in\left(0, \frac{1}{100}\right), \varepsilon>0$ is small.
Theorem 3.1 Let the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$. Then for some time $T>0$ there exists a unique solution $u \in \mathbf{C}\left([0, T], \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}\right)$ of the Cauchy problem (2). If in addition we assume that the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$ have a sufficiently small norm $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{1,0}+\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{0,1} \equiv \varepsilon>0$, then there exists a unique solution $u \in \mathbf{C}\left([0, T], \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}\right)$ of the Cauchy problem (2) on a finite time interval $[0, T]$ with $T>2$, such that

for all $t \in[0, T]$.
In the next lemma we obtain the a priori estimate of solutions in the norm $\mathbf{X}$.

Lemma 3.2 Let the initial data $u_{0} \in \mathbf{H}^{1,0} \cap \mathbf{H}^{0,1}$ have a sufficiently small norm $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{1,0}+\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{0,1} \equiv \varepsilon>0$. Also we assume that $\sup _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\arg \hat{u}_{0}(\xi)-\frac{\pi n}{2}\right|<\frac{\pi}{8}-\varepsilon$ for some $n \in \mathbf{Z}$, and $\inf _{|\xi| \leq 1}\left|\hat{u}_{0}(\xi)\right|>C \varepsilon$. Then there exists a unique global solution of the Cauchy problem (2) such that

Proof Applying the result of Theorem 3.1 and using a standard continuation argument we can find a maximal time $T>2$ such that

We start with the estimate of the norm $\|\mathcal{J} u\|$. Applying the operator $\mathcal{J}$ to equation (2) we get

& \quad+C\|u\|_{\infty}^{2}\|\partial u\|\left(\|\psi \mathcal{K} u\|_{\infty}+t^{-\frac{1}{4}}\|\mathcal{\partial} u\|\right)^{2}  \tag{10}\\
& \quad \leq C \varepsilon^{3-3 \gamma} t^{-\frac{3}{4}}\left(1+\varepsilon^{2+3 \gamma} \log (t+1)\right)^{-\frac{3}{2}}
\end{align*}

Application of the energy method to equation (8) via estimates (9) and (10) yields

=- & \frac{1}{t} e^{-\frac{2}{3} i t \xi^{2}} \Omega\left(t \xi^{2}\right) \bar{f}^{3} f^{-1} v e^{-2 \phi-4 i g}+O\left(\varepsilon^{3-3 \gamma} t^{-\frac{5}{4}}\right) \\
& +O\left(\varepsilon^{5-5 \gamma} t^{-1} \psi\left(1+\varepsilon^{2+3 \gamma} \log (t+1)\right)^{-\frac{5}{2}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

We let $\phi$ and $g$ be real valued functions such that

Denote $\mu_{T}=\arg f(T, \xi)$ and since $\arg \Omega(0)=0$, we have

&+O\left(\varepsilon^{4-10 \gamma} t^{-1} e^{-2 \phi}\left(1+\varepsilon^{2+3 \gamma} \log (t+1)\right)^{-1}\right)

Let us prove the following estimates

&>1+\varepsilon^{2+3 \gamma} \log \left(\min \left(t, \xi^{-2}\right)\right)

for all $|\xi| \leq 1$ and $t \in\left[2, T_{1}\right]$.
By virtue of the second equation of system (17) via (19) we see that

Proof of Theorem 1.1 The global existence of solutions follows from Lemma 3.2. We need only to prove asymptotic formula (4). By Lemmas 2.2, 3.2 we have

By the third equation of system (13) we see that there exists a unique final state $W_{+}(\xi)=\lim _{t \rightarrow \infty} f(t, \xi) \in \mathbf{L}^{\infty}(\mathbf{R})$ such that
