

# GARRETT MATTINGLEY Catherine of Aragon

This is a fascinating book, scholarly, well-proportioned, vivid yet unobtrusive in its writing, coolly intelligent but not inhuman in its handling of character, devoid of special pleading and without a trace of religious partisanship. Mr Mattingley's familiarity with the diplomatic archives of the Continent serves him well. It is arguable that his use of these sources may have made him less than just to Henry VIII. But his two ambassadors, De Puebla and Eustache Chapuys, are notable examples of balanced portraiture.

# The British Empire, 1815-1939

By PAUL KNAPLUND

At the crisis in the history of the world, the role of the British Empire is of the greatest importance, not only to its members but to the whole world community. There is, therefore, a special timeliness in Professor Knaplund's book. It is the work of a scholar of Norwegian birth and American education and citizenship. He has studied the history of the great experiment, or series of experiments, that we call the British Empire, from the outside. He has brought to his study the equipment of a critical scholar. The result is a clear, learned and most instructive record of the creation and the growth of the New Empire. We are made aware of the comparative novelty of British rule over a great part of the world; we are introduced to the domestic controversies that accompanied imperial expansion; the relationship between the history of the island nucleus and the overseas dependencies, and the influence of the various parts of the Empire on each other are made plain to us; and so is the role of the Empire in world politics. Professor Knaplund writes as a scholar; he is no blind apologist or carping critic. The result of his scholarship is a fascinating record of a strange, eventful history, full of instruction for our times.
