#### **BRONCHIAL ASTHMA**

Sufferers from bronchial asthma are usually infected with one or other of the microbes which are found in catarrhal conditions of the respiratory tract, though the asthmatic condition is due to hypersensitiveness to the proteins of the micro-organism, or to the products of its metabolism, rather than to the mere infection. Excellent results have been obtained in these cases by the administration of a vaccine containing relatively small numbers of the various microbes found in respiratory catarrhal infections.
