#### FOREWORD.

At the second Annual Meeting of the Society (October 10th, 1910), on the motion of Mr. H. H. Halls, the following resolution was unanimously passed:—"That it is desirable the Society should now commence to publish Proceedings, and that the matter be referred to a Committee with full power to publish the first part." The Committee elected consisted of Lieut.-Col. Underwood. Dr. W. Allen Sturge, Mr. W. H. Burrell, F.L.S., Mr. J. T. Hotblack, F.G.S., Mr. H. H. Halls, and Mr. W. G. Clarke. At their first meeting it was decided that the part should contain a record of the first two sessions of the Society, that preference should be given to papers dealing with East Anglia, and that those which -on account of the Society not issuing "Proceedings"-had been printed elsewhere, should not be reprinted, but the place of their publication should be notified. Some of the best papers read to the Society do not, therefore, appear in this part of the "Proceedings," but it is hoped that in future these will form the recognised medium for the publication of original papers relating to the prehistoric archæology of East Anglia, and for permanently recording the specimens of interest found in the same area.

With a subscription of 1/6 only for the first session, and initial expenses which will not occur again, it was found impossible to issue this part with the funds of the Society. An appeal was therefore made to a few supporters, who willingly subscribed towards the cost of publication, and we are indebted to the generosity of the following: Mrs. Sturge, Messrs. G. F. Buxton, F.Z.S., J. Chambers, C. Chambers, J. H. Gurney, F.Z.S., H. H. Halls, F. W. Harmer, F.G.S., J. T. Hotblack, F.G.S., and B. Lowerison, the Baron Anatole von Hügel, Mr. J. Reid Moir, Dr. L. H. Pegler, Mr. C. Silcock, Dr. W. Allen Sturge, Lieut.-Colonel Underwood, and Mr. H. B. Woodward, F.R.S., F.G.S. During the preparations for publication it was felt desirable greatly to enlarge the scope of the part, to deal with most important subjects, and to illustrate them. This was only possible through the kindness of Dr. W. Allen Sturge, M.V.O., who made himself responsible for such extra expenditure as has been incurred.
