The *entire* text of article manuscripts, including displayed quotations and footnotes, must be typed double-spaced with generous margins to allow for copy editing. If you use a word processor, *do not* justify the right margin. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively and appear in a separate section at the end of the text. Other guidelines for the preparation of manuscripts for submission to the *Journal of British Studies* will be sent on request. Articles should conform to *The Chicago Manual of Style* (13th ed.) in matters of style and will be edited accordingly. The Editors may suggest other changes in the interest of clarity and economy of expression.
