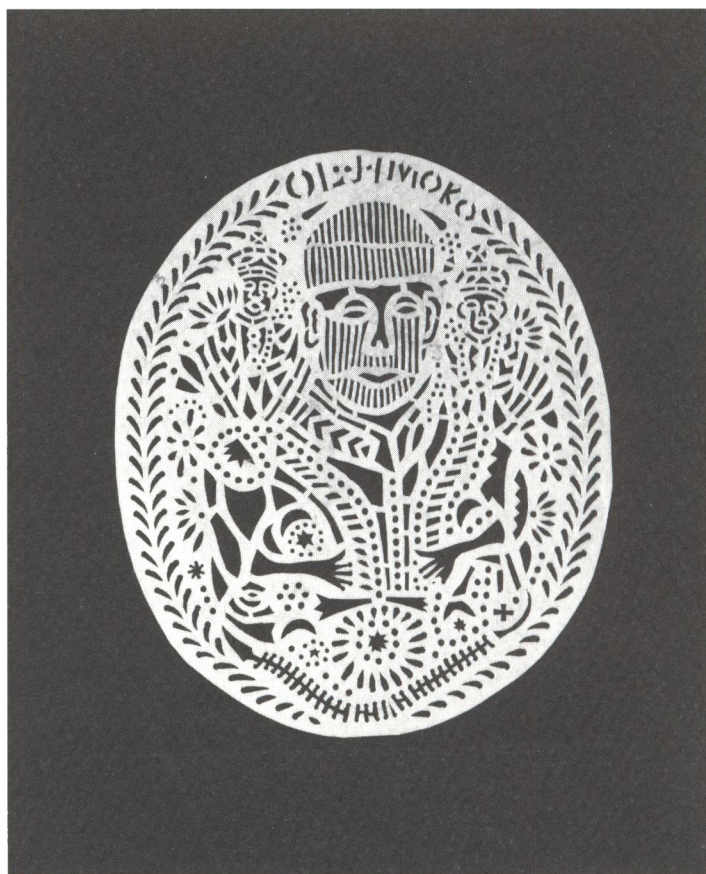

His most recent publications have appeared in *The Canadian Journal of African Studies* and *Development and Change*.

**JANE I. GUYER** is assistant professor of Anthropology at Boston University. The present paper is an off-shoot of a project that re-examined, in 1988, the Western Nigerian agricultural economy first studied by the author in 1968-69.
