THE METAPHYSICS OF DESCARTES

A STUDY OF THE MEDITATIONS, by L. J. BECK. In a previous work, the *Method of Descartes*, the author used the *Regulae* as the basic text for a commentary which also gave a detailed exposition of Descartes' doctrine of method. This volume treats the *Meditations*, together with the *Objections* and *Replies*, in a similar way. Descartes himself considered that 'the sum-total' of all that he had written on metaphysics was contained in the *Meditations*, which is rightly considered his masterpiece. The principle adopted is that Descartes' arguments should be read in the contexts in which they were first conceived. His metaphysical doctrine is unfolded in a logical analysis following strictly the order of argument which alone demonstrates the systematic unity of the Cartesian doctrine. \$8.50.

FORMS AND LIMITS OF UTILITARIANISM

By DAVID LYONS. Moral philosophers have long sought to reconcile Utility and Obedience to rules. The most recent result of their efforts is rule-utilitarianism. This book is a critique of the main forms of utilitarianism. It proceeds from an analysis of the utilitarian version of the argument, 'What if everyone did the same', and of utilitarian conceptions of moral rules, to the conclusion that the new forms of utilitarianism cannot provide solutions to old problems. For many of the new theories prove to be materially identical with their predecessors. Moreover, a re-examination of Fairness and Promising shows that no form of utilitarianism can account for these aspects of morality. \$5.95.
